



Report on the Faith Communities Housing Summit: Held at FCUCC Appleton on Saturday, October 12, our church hosted the first ever faith-based affordable housing summit in our area. People representing over 30 area congregations, several local non-



profits, and a few city and state government entities attended an intensive day-long event with the purpose of considering specific ways to address the escalating housing crisis in the Fox Cities. Attendees, who were given ample pre-summit resources to digest, came ready to consider a small number of specific and focused solutions presented throughout the day. Our featured speaker, Rev. Mark Elsdon, encouraged attendees to imagine the possibilities churches have to use

their physical and financial resources for projects that could transform neighborhoods. State Rep. Lee Snodgrass and City Community Development Director Kara Homan counseled using the powers given to all citizens to influence policy and support the development of new housing. Attendees further learned about ways to create living wage jobs and to foster community culture in neighborhoods as viable approaches to relieving the housing crisis and to assuring strong, healthy social connections. Finally, we heard about the current state of homelessness in the Fox Cities and ways faith communities can have an immediate impact on reducing those numbers. Several primary objectives of the summit were: to understand what resources are already locally available to address the housing crisis, to energize people around feasible and focused projects, and to join forces with other faith groups wherever possible. As these become clearer in the weeks and months to come, our entire congregation will be invited to participate in efforts to end homelessness here and now.

E2F (Empty to Full) Pans: On Sunday, November 3, FCUCC will participate in a project to allow members to prepare pans of food, in their own home, primarily to serve Pillars, with a smaller number going to COTS & Apricity. All are serving homeless people. Willing participants can pick up an empty pan that contains the recipe & shopping list to prepare & fill the pan with an easy recipe. (Cost is approximately \$16.00.) The recipes are so simple...no cooking or basic cooking required. This is a great activity for all ages and skills. (The pans are not baked; the shelter will do this.) The prepared pan is returned on Sunday, November 10, before the church service. Note: if you're unable to bring the pan back on November 10, it can be placed in the church kitchen freezer the week before. Call the office to make sure the kitchen is open.

Book Discussion: Trains, Jesus, and Murder: On November 7, 2024, First

Congregational's Theology Discussion Group will begin discussing its next book, Trains, Jesus, and Murder: The Gospel According to Johnny Cash by Richard Beck (2019; 205 pp.) "Saints and sinners, all jumbled up together." That's the genius of Johnny Cash, and that's what the gospel is ultimately all about. Johnny Cash sang about and for people on the margins. He famously played concerts in prisons, where he sang both murder ballads and gospel tunes in the same set. It's this juxtaposition between light and dark, writes Richard Beck, that makes Cash one of the most authentic theologians in memory. *Trains, Jesus, and Murder* explores the theology of Johnny Cash by investigating a dozen of Cash's songs. In reflecting on Cash's lyrics, and the passion with which he sang them, we gain a deeper understanding of the enduring faith of the Man in Black. If you enjoy reading and discussing good books on themes of religion, spirituality, justice, and growth in faith, we invite you to join us on November 7 as Theo Group begins reading this new book together. We meet on the first and third Thursdays of each month 12:00-1:30PM, with some participants gathering on site at Chefo's Pancake House in Kimberly and others participating online on Zoom. 
- 1. We Are Still Here! Native American Truths Everyone Should Know by Traci Sorell. 12 Native American kids from various tribes present historical and contemporary laws, policies, struggles and victories in Native life.
- 2. Thirteen Moons on Turtle's Back: A Native American Year of Moons by Joseph Bruchac and Jonathan London. This collection of poems is about each of the 13 moons in a year that are powered by the turtle whose shell contains the mysteries of all the different moons.
- 3. *The Great Change* by White Deer of Autumn. In this story, a wise grandmother explains the meaning of death to her questioning granddaughter.
- 4. *Ajijaak/Crane* by Cecelia La Pointe. This is a bilingual (Ojibwe/English) story about the environment and healing justice through the story of a young whooping crane who finds both her voice and a family during her first migration.



Advent Study: The Christmas Letters: You may or may not know the story of your



birth. If you do, there is something special about hearing your origin story again and remembering how it all began for you. That's why we observe Advent: to celebrate how it all began for us. In *The Christmas Letters*, Magrey deVega invites you to hear about the miracle of Christ's birth from those who first told the story. The letters in the New Testament, known as the Epistles, contain the first attempts by the church to understand and celebrate the mystery of the Incarnation. They point us to the origins of what we believe about Jesus, fully human and fully divine. By spending time with these holy, ancient words this

Advent, you'll come to know the meaning of Christ's coming like never before. Read the New Testament letters, Romans, 1 John, Philippians, and Colossians as your first Christmas letters of the season and find within them an invitation from God to deepen your understanding of the Incarnation and embrace a fuller commitment to Jesus Christ. The study will convene in the Upper Lounge following worship (10:45-11:45AM) throughout the Sundays of Advent (December 1, 8, 15, and 22). <u>Henderson Settlement Report - Creating Opportunities for Better Lives Through</u>
<u>Christ-Centered Service</u>: Our mighty group of 12 completed the four jobs that we had signed on to do:

*Install five windows. This was for a family we had worked with last year where we installed four windows. Four people worked there.

*Remove old flooring; install new luxury vinyl plank flooring in kitchen, living room, hallway. In the same house, ceilings were painted in two bedrooms, kitchen, living room and hallway. Two groups with two people on the flooring, two on painting detail.

*Another group of four people built an 8 ft. X 12 ft. porch with a metal roof. Four groups in four days – all jobs completed! Five of us decided we could handle one more job – pretty straightforward. Remove old flooring and install luxury vinyl plank in the living room. We had the baseboards, old flooring and felt paper all removed in record time. Then...expect the unexpected, be flexible, stay calm, seek a solution...for **termites!** We did what we could for the termite damage by reinforcing floor joists, spraying for the termites, laying new subflooring and new sheets of plywood. We accomplished the much-needed repair; however, the new flooring was not installed. We hope that job will be completed soon by another volunteer group. It was a great week of work, strengthening connections with others in our group, with our families, with other work camp volunteers and with our God. Land Covenant: The land now occupied by Appleton, Wisconsin and surrounding areas - including the current site of First Congregational UCC - was the home, hunting, gathering, and farming land of the First Peoples of this territory: the Ho Chunk Nation and the Menominee Nation. Other tribes were forcibly re-located to

this region by the actions of colonialism. Despite centuries of reprehensible treatment, the peoples of these sovereign nations are robust and enduring among us.

We are truly saddened by the genocide of their ancestors, the seizure of their lands, and the repression of their cultures and languages. We acknowledge that we benefit from the economic and social legacy left by settler colonialism.



We are grateful that many members of these original Nations have honorably served and defended the United States.
